Restoration ecology and gardening differ only in degree, not necessarily in their goals or approach. This seminar will encourage us to think about “gardening” at the large scale. Can tallgrass prairie restorations be simultaneously used to sequester carbon, create habitat, and meet our gardening objectives? At which scales is this possible? Can we blend an agricultural approach with prairie restoration using domestic grazers and thus achieve “gardening” at massive scales?
