Subject: Dues Option

At the directors meeting on Saturday, November 5, 2005, a motion was made, seconded and approved, for a reduction in individual dues for our organization from \$30 to \$15 beginning for 2007. This proposal will be put on a ballot that will be timely sent before the April convention.

The new dues as of January 1, 2007 are as follows:

- Individual membership: \$15
- Family membership: \$20
- Life membership: \$200

If the ballot proposal passes, membership in AHS will no longer be an automatic feature of TGOA/MGCA membership. Thus, the new basic dues will not include any magazine.

Any member wishing to continue with AHS in 2007 will have an option to do so for the discounted cost that TGOA/MGCA is charged by AHS.

This will not affect our affiliation with AHS in 2006.

The board of directors is making every effort to respond to the wishes and concerns of the membership.

We feel this effort should have better club and national cooperation, which should lead to increased membership.

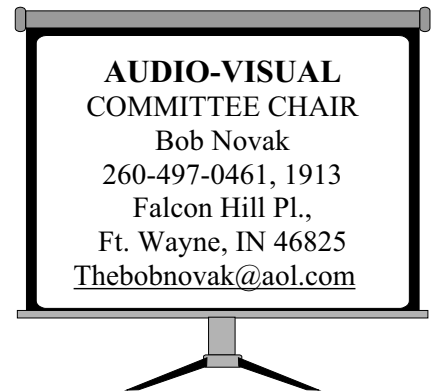

**Profiles for the 2006 National 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President and the 2007 National 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President Elect.**



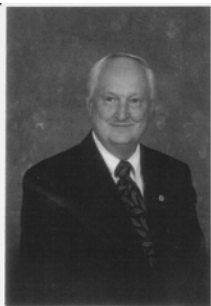
Bob Grossman, Dallas, TX was installed as 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President in November 2005.

**2006 TGOA/MGCA National Convention, April 20-22, featured gardens in Spartanburg, SC**

Two of the gardens that you will see on April 21, 2006, are Milliken & Company and Hatcher Garden & Woodland Preserve. Milliken is an internationally known, privately-held textile and chemical manufacturer for industries as varied as interior furnishings, apparel, automobiles, aeronautics, sports, hospitality, and the military, among many more. Its headquarters are located in Spartanburg, SC. The company focuses on safety, quality, research, innovation, and customer service.

In the late 1980s, Chairman (continued on the top of page 4)



and CEO Roger Milliken had the idea that his employees would be healthier and more productive if encouraged to exercise on site. To that end, he set about creating a corporate environment that included an indoor fitness center, jogging trails, natural areas, and formal areas of beauty throughout the 600-acre campus of Milliken & Co. In the middle of an old peach orchard, he created an arboretum of national recognition, engaging Michael Dirr (Univ. of Georgia professor and author on woody landscape plants) and Rick Webel (Long island, NY, landscape architect) to set the stage.

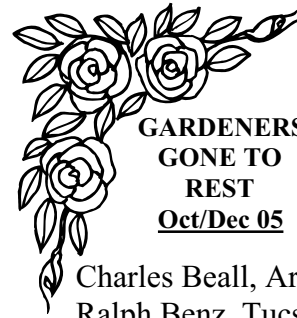
The arboretum contains approximately 150 trial cultivars of trees provided by and under the evaluation of J. Frank Schmidt Nursery of Boring, OR. Schmidt uses trial results in marketing for the Southeast. For Milliken, this information provides recommendations of plant material for use at Milliken manufacturing locations and is shared with the community. There are collections of magnolias, beeches, red and sugar maples, Japanese maples, conifers, hickories, elms, oaks, hollies, ashes, honey locusts, cherries, and crabapples.

Hatcher Garden began in 1969, when Harold and Josephine Hatcher retired to Spartanburg, South Carolina with the dream of creating a green space for the Spartanburg community. They bought a home within the city limits - an acre of land with running water on it and room for expansion into neighboring lots. Once

dominated by cotton fields, the land had long since been abandoned and had deep gullies. Undeterred, they began turning their dream of a community green space into a reality: amending soil, building paths and ponds, and planting over 10,000 trees, shrubs and flowers. They welcomed the public to their backyard garden and expanded it over the years by buying the properties contiguous to them.

As the garden grew, members of the Spartanburg Men's Garden Club, the Spartanburg Garden Club Council, Spartanburg Technical College, the City of Spartanburg, and the Spartanburg Master Gardener program became intrigued with the Hatcher and their vision for the garden. These community members joined as volunteers providing labor as well as financial support for the garden's development. The result is 10 acres of green space in the center of the city of Spartanburg hosting a diversity of flora and fauna and complemented by water ponds, walking paths and a variety of garden spaces. Today, Hatcher Garden is a not-for-profit organization and Spartanburg's only public garden. Spartanburg is excited about this opportunity to show you what one of the top corporations in the world and our local, signature garden are doing to enhance our local community. Both are leading the way in promoting plants in the workplace, home and community. lm

**STEPHEN R. SMITH**  
Obituary from the Ashville  
Citizen-Times newspaper:

Stephen R. Smith passed away Thursday, Nov. 24, 2005, at Deerfield Episcopal Retirement Community, from heart failure.

Born in Troy, N.Y., Sept. 30, 1924, Steve grew up in Philadelphia and served in the Army Air Corps during World War II. After the war, he graduated from the University of Virginia and Yale Law School. **HE'S THE TREES' BEST FRIEND.**

If local trees could pick a champion, Chuck Brasher would be at the top of their list. Because trees have been at the top of Brasher's list his entire life.

Brasher, 83, owned Country Club Tree Service for 47 years, worked as a city forester in the '50s and has won more than 40 awards for his work. And since 1976 he has compiled a champion tree list, honoring hundreds of large and unusual trees in the Kansas City area. He was just finishing his latest update of large, impressive or unusual trees when we caught up with him.

**Q.** How does a tree become one of your "champion" trees?

**A.** I have a file on every tree I've ever measured. If a new tree (of

the same species and variety) is bigger than one I have on my current list, I replace it.

**How many trees are on your latest list?**

205 varieties

**Out of all your "champions," what's the biggest of all?**

It's a cottonwood. It's 306 inches around, 110 feet high with a spread of 120 feet. It's located at Lamar and Foxridge Road in Overland Park.

**What areas does your list cover?**

Johnson, Wyandotte, Clay and Jackson counties.

**We have to ask, if you could be a tree, what kind of tree would you be?**

Swamp white oak. My favorite tree.

**Why?**

It's just a stately tree, very majestic.

**Didn't you have a tree planted in your honor?**

I had two. One at Loose Park and another at Powell Gardens, both swamp white oaks.

**How do people use your list?**

Scouts use it to identify trees for merit badges, and horticultural schools use it for field trips. People in the landscape business use it to see what a certain tree will look like when it has matured. Families use it for fun.

**Are most of your champion trees big and old?**

No. Some are just unusual. And trees don't have to be big to be old. The oldest known trees in the world are bristlecone pines on the coast of California. These trees are probably not over 12-15 feet tall, but they claim they're up to 4,000 years old.

**Name an unusual tree on your list.**

The common jujube tree, also known as a Chinese date tree. This

is the tree that biblical scholars think the crown of thorns might have been made from. It's in Prairie Village.

**Ever thought of, er, branching out to other states?**

No. There's a national list of champion trees done by the National Forest Service. My list has two champions. One's a rock elm and the other's a dwarf chinquapin oak, both in Swope Park.

**What's most important to you these days?**

Making sure we take care of our trees. "Only God can make a tree" is true. But he put us here as custodians. And over the years man hasn't done too great a job saving the environment.

**CAN HE GARDEN OR WHAT???**

Bob Smoker of the GOA of Topeka, KS grew 1670 pounds of tomatoes in 2005 and 2311 pounds in 1998. He only used 40 plants to realize such a huge harvest and used no commercial fertilizer. The only non-organic product he used was a couple of TUMS tablets around each plant for calcium.

Most of us have heard Bob Smoker referred to as the "King of Compost" but now think that we'll have to give him a new title of King of Tomatoes.

He adds compost consisting mostly of composted leaves and rabbit manure in the fall the last 25 years to build up his soil. He starts each year with twelve tomato plants in early April with Wall-O-Water protecting them from freezing temperatures and giving them about a month head start over the remaining 28 plants, and (continued on the top of page 5)

plantings the balance after the GOA plant sale the 1st Saturday in May. The variety of tomatoes is Celebrity.

The first tomato was picked on July 5th last year and sometimes it has been as early as June 29th. His soil is so mellow he can stick his arm in it up to his elbow.

Bob sells his tomatoes at home using word of mouth, to many neighbors and faithful customers. His fruits have traveled to 14 states including the state of Alaska. They're known for their rich flavor and low acid content. Yum!

Bob is widely known for his expertise in composting and willingness to share that knowledge. He has a compost bin 24 feet by 30 feet by 4 feet and it is divided down the middle. People who know about his operation call him when they have bags of leaves ready for him to pick up and he gets all the rabbit manure he can use from a local rabbit breeder. He has picked up as many as 1300 bags of leaves in one year. He has given 157 presentations on his methods and successes to various garden clubs, civic groups, schools, etc. over the years even at the GOA National Convention in Colorado Springs, Colorado in 1996 and also 58 different organizations.

Bob also is serving as a Mo-Kan Region National Director and club officer.

Bob's motto is: "If you are not having fun, you are not doing it right."

## POINSETTIA

With approval from the Landreth Seed Company

Scientific name: *Euphorbia pulcherrima* meaning "very beautiful euphorbia."

The poinsettia can honestly be called "The Christmas Flower" because no flower is more closely associated with a holiday than the poinsettia is with Christmas. Poinsettias are native to Central and South America. In their native habitats, poinsettias are perennial shrubs, which can grow to a height of 10 feet. In Chile and Peru, the poinsettia is known as "The Crown of the Andes".

The *Euphorbia* family of plants includes many shrubs used for hedges in temperate climates and some tropicals with very interesting leaves,

which are grown as houseplants. The *Euphorbias* share the characteristic of a milky white sap. Many people believe that the white sap is poisonous, especially to children, but in a study conducted by Ohio State University it was concluded that if a 50 pound child ate 500 of the red leaves of a poinsettia he might have a slight tummy ache, but nothing more.

The Aztecs loved the plant, which they called *Cuetlaxochitl*. The milky white sap of the plant was used to control fevers and the red leaves were used to make a reddish dye. Montezuma, the last great King of the Aztecs, would bring caravans of poinsettias to Mexico City because he loved the plant so much and it did not grow naturally in the high altitude. #### They're Tough – Rain or Shine:

Sewn-braid palm leaf hats are the toughest hats you will find. The overlapping layers of palm braid form an almost impenetrable sun block. And when they get wet, they stiffen and keep their shape making them great in sun or rain.

#### You Can Wet'm and Shape'm:

They are easily re-shaped with plain water – no stem is required. You can use a spray bottle, hold hat under the faucet, or dip it in a bucket and easily shape by hand.

#### You Can Crush'm and Pop Them Back Out To Shape:

A horse can step on one and if the hoof doesn't cut completely through, you can pop it back out and keep wearing it. Packing them flat in a suitcase is possible, but will require some reshaping.

**Poinsettia, continued.**

Americans learned of the plant when Joel Roberts Poinsett who was the first United States Ambassador to Mexico found the plant growing next to a road. Poinsett was an avid amateur botanist. He took cuttings of the plant and rooted them in his South Carolina greenhouse. He then shared some of these cuttings with William Bartram and Robert Buist. Bartram's Nursery is credited with being the first place in the United States to sell Euphorbia Pulcherrima, but Robert Buist deserves the credit for renaming the plant

the poinsettia and for popularizing it throughout America. The Buist Seed Company became the most successful seed house in America during the 1840's and 1850's largely because of the poinsettia.

The showy red "flower petals" of the common poinsettia are actually leaves of the plant called bracts. These leaves change to a beautiful color when the plant is about to bloom. The blossom is actually a tiny yellow flower that can be seen at the center of the bracts. The bracts turn their beautiful colors in order to attract insects to the tiny flower.

Today, poinsettias come in many colors including white, pink, champagne and variegated varieties, but still the favorite color is red. Joel Poinsett and Robert Buist would be very proud of their introduction if they were alive today. The poinsettia is

the most popular potted plant ever. More than 60 million plants are sold each year in the six weeks before Christmas. It truly is America's Christmas flower. lsc
