RE: Letters of intent to attend 2009 national convention of The Gardeners of America/Men's Garden Clubs of America:

The Santa Rosa Men's Garden Club of Santa Rosa is proud to be hosting the 2009 annual convention of The Gardeners of America/Men's Garden Clubs of America.

Our theme for the convention is "Roses and Wine in 2009" and keeping with this theme, we have several winery and garden tours being considered, including the gardens and winery at Korbel, Ferrari Carano winery and gardens; Benzinger winery and gardens and Kunde winery with their wonderful wine caves. No visit to Sonoma county would be complete without touring Armstrong Woods State Park with their 300 foot tall ancient redwood trees, or a short drive to Bodega Bay where Hitchcock's "The Birds" was filmed near the shores of the Pacific ocean. The 20th century's most famous gardener, Luther Burbank is a Santa Rosa icon and his farm and gardens will be on our tour

schedule. Another very interesting place to visit is the Charles Schulz museum, where you will find the cartoonist's "Peanuts" memorabilia.

We obviously can't do all of the above, but for those arriving early or staying on after the convention these are all great places to visit.

We have already confirmed the Korbel and Armstrong Woods tour. We have also contacted several interesting speakers for our seminars, all of which will tell the story of Sonoma County agriculture and gardening.

The convention will be held at the Flamingo Conference Resort & Spa in Santa Rosa, CA on May 28, 29 & 30th. Web site – www.flamingoresort.com.

The room rate will be reduced to \$119 plus 11% city and state tax per night for a standard room, 2 queens or 1 king, or \$139 plus 11% city and state tax for a deluxe room for advanced reservations.

This convention rate will be extended for one week before and one week after to any guests wishing to arrive early or stay on after the convention. You just have to let us know ahead of time. An early bird registration fee of \$295 per person up thru March 31, 2009 and a registration fee of \$325 from April 1 thru

May 15, 2009 will cover all meals, seminars, tours, door prizes, etc. The hotel has excellent food, by the way.

While in Fort Wayne, we had several offers from member clubs to make a donation to the convention that would be repaid from the profits of the convention. If we could get a quick response from these and other clubs, along with contributions from our local businesses, there is a good chance that the registration fee could be lowered.

For those attendees who are arriving early or staying on after the convention, there is so much more within northern California to visit. San Francisco is a beautiful one hour drive to the south across the Golden Gate Bridge, especially spectacular in the early evening. Take a thirty minute drive east along the Valley of the Moon highway to the quaint town of Sonoma where you can sample local cheeses at the Cheese Factory and visit the village of Glen Ellen to taste the local olive oils at The Olive Press, or spend an hour at Jack London State Park nearby and tour his house and the museum. The drive to Sonoma passes through pastoral hills dotted with vineyards

and continues on to the city of Napa and the Napa Valley.

A thirty minute drive to the north takes you to Healdsburg, another small town that is a fun place to visit with its many boutique shops and restaurants. Healdsburg is the gateway to The Dry Creek Valley Appellation and a drive along Dry Creek road is a must for anyone interested in seeing the many small vineyards in the valley of the upper Russian River. Stop at the Dry Creek general store for a deli sandwich and a beer before heading back.

Lake Tahoe is a four hour drive to the east (the drive alone is worth the trip, not to mention beautiful Lake Tahoe itself and the many casinos.) Monterey and Carmel are a three-hour drive to the south. Yosemite is about a five hour drive to the southeast. Or you may just want to stay on in beautiful Sonoma county with our natural beauty, mild climate, many wineries, fine restaurants and other points of interest. There is obviously enough here to make this your vacation destination.

HOW TO GET TO SANTA ROSA



You can fly directly into Santa Rosa airport via Alaska/Horizon Airlines. You do have to connect through Los Angeles, Las Vegas, Portland or Seattle. We have a small airport

and it is only fifteen minutes from the airport to the Flamingo Resort Hotel. It would be perfect for those who want to vacation in any of the above areas prior to or after the convention. We will have members available to pick you up at the airport and take you to the Flamingo at no charge. Just let us know ahead of time when you plan to arrive.

You can also fly into San Francisco or Oakland, CA. There is air porter service from both of those airports to Santa Rosa. I use the Santa Rosa/San Francisco air porter frequently. It runs every hour between 7:00 a.m. and 10 p.m. It leaves San Francisco airport just outside the baggage claim area from the center divide. Be sure you watch for the "Santa Rosa Air Porter" as there are similar busses to other destinations. It is a large comfortable bus and takes about 1-1/2 hours to get to Santa Rosa. If you are going to fly into Oakland or San Francisco, check out the air porter website – airportexpressinc.com. You will stop in Petaluma, where they will collect the fare - \$32 one way, and also in Rohnert Park before you arrive at the Days Inn in Santa Rosa. You could also stay on the bus to the

Santa Rosa airport, but it will be more convenient to get off at the Days Inn, where we will have members waiting to take you to The Flamingo Resort Hotel at no charge. We will have numbers to call for you to contact letting us know when you plan to arrive. If you call us from Petaluma, we would have plenty of time to get to the Days Inn or the Santa Rosa airport. Hopefully, you will be traveling during the day as the ride from either airport is a beautiful trip in itself.

Of course, renting cars at San Francisco or Oakland is quite reasonable, especially if some of you carpool! Please email us for directions. Cars are also available in Santa Rosa as well. There is an Enterprise here.

Plant-sharing program offers encouragement

During the Depression, Julie Gladfelder's father always brought home something beautiful for his wife, whether it was an item he had traded for or had found in the woods.

"It was so there would be something encouraging," said Gladfelder, 78, of Cedar Rapids. "It was such a bleak time."

Gladfelder, a community volunteer, knows Iowa flood victims are going through their own bleak times. She delivered floral arrangements to flood shelters this summer.

"Just being in a big room with cots, there weren't too many pretty things to look at," she said.

Then Gladfelder and Sheri Mealhouse of Cedar Rapids decided to do something more. They started a program called Neighbor to Neighbor Sharing Plants.

Since October, they have given away nearly 180

houseplants to flood victims.

"We'd like to help as many people as we can," Mealhouse said, adding that flood victims who don't want plants can take one to give to someone who's helped them.

Plants have gone to residents of Federal Emergency Management Agency mobile homes and those who've returned to their rehabbed homes.

"When you lose all your plants, you don't have anything to make it like home," said Diane Smith, 72, who returned to her home at 910 H Ave. NW in late October.

The single-story house was flooded to the countertops. Everything in the basement and much on the main level was lost. "We moved six times since the floods," Smith said. "I'm so glad to be home."

She said her house will feel more like home with the four houseplants she was given recently.

Gladfelder can identify with the flood victims who come to her northeast Cedar Rapids home to choose plants. She had to replace her furnace and lost everything stored in her basement to water that came up through her drain during the June flood.

Caring for the houseplants is a labor of love. A blooming pink Christmas cactus, spider plants, coleus, Boston ferns, jade plants and more cover table after table in every room of her house.

About 20 people have donated houseplants and materials such as potting soil and baskets. One woman donated 100 African violets.

Larger plants could go to churches or offices,

Gladfelder said. The program will expand to offer free perennials to flood victims in the spring.

Notes are included with each houseplant to provide encouragement and a connection between donor and recipient.

Gladfelder voiced agreement as she pointed out messages such as "A shared plant is a double blessing" and "Plants carry love from one home to another."

"It's just so neat to hear everyone's stories," she said. "It seems a frivolous thing, but plants mean something to people. They are so thrilled."
