**MAGIC PLANT FOOD!**

*Reader's Digest*

Spraying plants with an aspirin solution every three weeks can boost their growth rate and veggie yield while reducing disease and pests. Why? Plants make salicylic acid when stressed, so being proactive may help ward off problems. Make the spray by dissolving a 325 mg aspirin in a tablespoon of cider vinegar, then add to a gallon of water.

**Interesting facts about onions**

In 1919 when the flu killed 40 million people there was this doctor that visited many farmers to see if he could help them combat the flu. Many of the farmers and their families had contracted the

flu and many members had died.

The doctor came upon this one farmer and to his surprise, everyone was very healthy. When the doctor asked what the farmer was doing that was different, the wife replied that she had placed an unpeeled onion in a dish in the rooms of the home, (probably only two rooms back then). The doctor couldn't believe it and asked if he could have one of the onions and place it under the microscope. She gave him one and when he did this, he did find the flu virus in the onion. It obviously absorbed the bacteria, therefore, keeping the family healthy.

Now, I heard this story from an old time farmer, my grandfather. He said that several years ago many of his work hands were coming down with the flu and so were many of his friends. The next year he placed several bowls with onions around his outbuildings. To his surprise, none of his people got sick. It must work. (And no, my grandfather was not an onion farmer).

The moral of the story is, buy some onions, and place them in bowls around your home. If you work at a desk, place one or two in your office or

under your desk or even on top somewhere. Try it and see what happens. We did it last year and we never got the flu.

If this helps you and your loved ones from getting sick, it is well worth it. So if you do get the flu, it just might be a mild case and you will rebound faster.

It's a cheap experiment and for a little effort and few bucks for onions it's worth it. Better yet a few home grown ones from your garden are even cheaper!

I read an article that said to cut both ends off an onion, put one end on a fork and then place the forked end into an empty jar, placing the jar next to the sick person at night. It said the onion would be black in the morning from the germs. I tried it and sure enough it happened just like that, the onion was a mess and the person began to feel better in the morning.

Another thing I read in the article was that onions and garlic placed around the room saved many people from the black plague years ago. They have powerful antibacterial and antiseptic properties.

**Onions can be poisonous.** I have seen my grandmother use an onion, which has been left

in the fridge from overnight. This can be very toxic and not a good practice. Buy smaller onions and discard any portion unused.

Next I will discuss a little about food poisoning. Most people in the summer worry about mayonnaise spoiling. But in fact all commercially made mayo is completely safe. It doesn't even have to be refrigerated. No harm in refrigerating it, but it's necessary. The pH in mayonnaise is set at a point that bacteria could not survive in that environment. When food poisoning is reported, the first thing the officials look for is when the 'victim' last ate ONIONS and where those onions came from (in the potato salad?). It's not the mayonnaise (as long as its not homemade mayo) that spoils in the outdoors. It's probably the onions, and if not the onions, it's the potatoes.

Onions are a huge magnet for bacteria, especially uncooked onions. You should never plan to keep a portion of a sliced onion. It's not even safe if you put it in a zip-lock bag and put it in your refrigerator. It's already contaminated enough just by being cut open and out for a bit, that it can be a danger to you (and doubly

watch out for those onions you put in your hotdogs at the baseball park!)

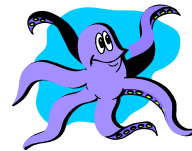
If you take the leftover onion and cook it like crazy, you'll probably be okay, but if you slice that leftover onion and put on your sandwich, you're asking for trouble. Both the onions and the moist potato in a potato salad will attract and grow bacteria faster than any commercial mayonnaise will even begin to break down.

So, how's that for news? Take it for what you will. I am going to be very careful about my onions from now on. For some reason, I see a lot of credibility coming from this information which came from a chemist and a company that produces millions of pounds of mayonnaise every year. Also, dogs (4 legged kinds) should never eat onions. Their stomachs cannot metabolize onions.

**Please remember it is dangerous to cut onions and try to use them to cook the next day, they become highly poisonous for even a single night and create toxic bacteria, which may cause adverse stomach infections because of excess bile secretions and even food poisoning.**

So keep growing onions but be careful how to use them in food and keep them away from your pet dog.

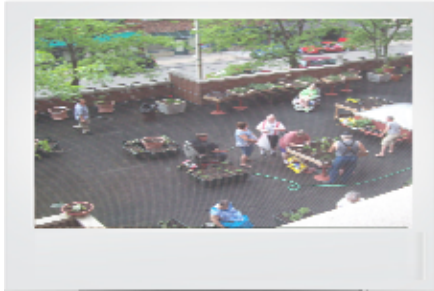

**GARDENING FROM THE HEART PROJECT**

**ROOTS ROCK COMMUNITY GARDENS, ROCKFORD IL**

In 2010, the Roots Rock Community Garden pilot project was created to address the importance and proliferation of community gardens. Among the many benefits of this project, is to try to reverse the national trend towards diet-related illnesses and to relearn the value of fresh health foods. The neighborhood-based community gardens have very nominal out-of-pocket costs to one individual. Grants are funding items such as seeds, plants, tools, soil and additives, lumber, and other additional items. The produce raised goes first to residents, then to area pantries through the Plant-A-Row for the Hungry program. Extra can be sold at farmer's markets.

Community Gardens paired with neighborhood groups can be more

successful. It's a community effort. Building and tending these types of gardens reduces neighborhood blight, breaks down barriers, fosters new or better relationships, builds leadership skills, and provides reasons to celebrate.

The Rockford Area GOA is instrumental in this very worthwhile project and we applaud them. What an incentive for all of us gardeners.
